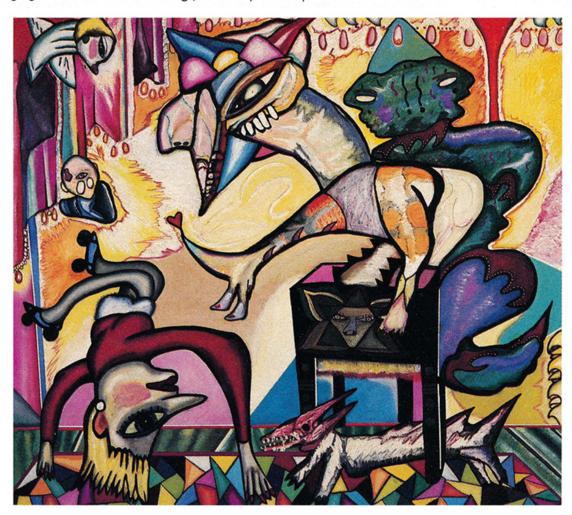

COMING IN FROM THE COLD

The expressive undercurrent A painterly and emotionally high-voltage Expressionism was kept alive during the early sixties by artists who didn't work in Chicago but showed here, especially Maryan and Peter Saul. Paul LaMantia, a contemporary of the Imagists, provided a bridge through the seventies to emerging artists now rediscovering paint's expressive potential.
